

TOTAL COMMUNITY INVESTMENT: \$3,554,000

COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

Data-driven model to provide inside-the-school supports and strip away nonacademic barriers to learning that low-income children face, from basic needs to trauma counseling to dental/vision health supports and much more.

Outcome: Students in Erie County achieve academic success.

NEW! With the launch of Erie High as a community school this fall, United Way will be completing the continuum of supports and services available to students in Erie's Public Schools from kindergarten through 12th grade.

Total investment: \$3,172,000

IMAGINATION LIBRARY

Providing FREE, high-quality, age- and developmentally appropriate books monthly to children from birth to their fifth birthday.

Outcome: Children in Erie County enter kindergarten ready to learn.

Total investment: \$268,000

BREAKING THE CYCLE OF POVERTY

United Way's work to address nonacademic barriers low-income students face in public schools is organized into four Community School Model pillars. Below are examples of how your investment was leveraged in the four pillars during the 2023-2024 school year.

AUTHENTIC FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Projects under this pillar aim to increase the number of families involved and invested in their student's success including participation in school activities and events. In addition, projects may provide access to adult education, employment and other family stability resources at the school building. Project examples include ongoing family engagement events, literacy kits, establishing parent committees, family movie nights and regional field trips that include family participation.

Students Served: 8,137 Total Funding Amount: \$98,970

EXPANDED LEARNING TIMES AND ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Projects under this pillar aim to provide access to enrichment activities that emphasize real-world learning and community problem solving. Programming at school may include opportunities after school, on weekends and during the summer. Project examples include grade-level experiential field trips, summer programming, after-school programming, standardized test incentives and care bags and grade-level readiness kits.

Students Served: 8,557
Total Funding Amount: \$222,898

POSITIVE ENVIRONMENT FOR WELLNESS AND LEARNING

Projects under this pillar aim to improve school readiness, school attendance, school safety and school culture. In addition, projects may increase access to health and wellness supports such as Social Emotional Learning (SEL), on-site physical and mental health and basic needs access. Project examples include kindergarten registration events, attendance awareness and incentives, staff appreciation initiatives, grade-level transition events, new family orientation and welcome packets.

Students Served: 8,137
Total Funding Amount: \$209,765

COMMUNITY AND NEIGHBORHOOD PARTNERSHIPS

Projects under this pillar aim to position the school building as the neighborhood hub and leverage in-kind donations and time to support school sustainability needs. Projects included school beautification, school library upgrade and United Way's annual National Night Out events.

Students Served: 3,225
Total Funding Amount: \$27,050
